This has been another very eventful year for our family. It culminated with the birth of our first grandchild. Isabelle Kate Lillian Keane was born on December 23 in Hamilton's St. Joseph's hospital. Marie was able to fly down a week early, to help with the preparation of enough meals to tide Christine and Adam over through the month of January at least. She was also present as a labour coach, so saw Isabelle being born. It was very special, and we then got to spend an entire week with her at home, including her first Christmas.

But I'm getting ahead of things! On the exchange front, we continued to host Levke Kluge until the end of January When she left us, we welcomed two boys – Jan Seiffert from Germany (Jan-July) and Brad Robinson from Australia (Jan to Dec).

Doug's parents both were ill at the end of January, and he spent a couple of days full time at the hospital while they were recovering. The positive result of the week was that Isabel was reassessed by the chief of dementia for Eastern Ontario, and was declared to NOT have Alzheimer's, which she had been told she had in 2006. Her whole outlook on life has changed. She and Dad turned 90 and 85 respectively this year. They have spent time in respite care for our holidays, and over Christmas are in Windsor Park Manor.

We did our usual skiing holiday in February, taking both boys and all our kids and their partners up to our timeshare in Mont-Tremblant. We had a wonderfully relaxing week, and Marie discovered her hip was totally back to normal. In March break, we did a road trip with the two boys down to Boston. We stayed in a hotel right along the river looking across at Marie's father's Alma Mater of MIT. We enjoyed the warmer weather, the sights and sounds (TD Gardens, Fenway Park, the Boston Symphony Hall, etc.) and even took in the sea-side for a delicious meal of lobster with all the fixings. We had a snow-storm for the drive back through Pennsylvania, which wasn't too bad but was not entirely expected.

In May, Jan went on a band trip to New York City and Brad joined the STS crowd for the Toronto trip. So Marie and Doug once again journeyed to Grimsby to visit with Adam and Christine (now 29). It was at this point that they told us they were expecting their first child for December. We were thrilled, as you can imagine!

Shortly after that, Stéphane completed his training to become a croupier at the Casino du Lac Leamy across the river from Ottawa. He deals Blackjack, and loves the interaction with people. They will be married in the Panorama Room at the National Arts Centre, overlooking the Rideau Canal and the new convention centre, and will have friends from as far away as Austria joining in the festivities. We also look forward to next August when Doug's nephew Ryan and his fiancée Raïsa Mirza will be married in Newfoundland.
